<b>SYSTEMS</b>	
<b>01.3</b> Sustainable patterns of living rely on the interdependence of healthy social, economic and ecological systems.	ELFG Hunger Banquet resources explore the ability of individuals to make sustainable choices which consider the interdependence of healthy social, economic and ecological systems.
<b>WORLD VIEWS</b>	
<b>01.4</b> World views that recognise the dependence of living things on healthy ecosystems, and value diversity and social justice are essential for achieving sustainability.	ELFG Hunger Banquet resources help develop world views that recognise that humans depend on healthy ecosystems to survive, especially those in developing countries, and value diversity and social justice are essential for achieving sustainability.
<b>01.5</b> World views are formed by experiences at personal, local, national and global levels, and are linked to individual and community actions for sustainability.	ELFG Hunger Banquet resources link the local, national and global, via stories, videos and written information, to help students form their world views. Students are encouraged to undertake individual and community actions for sustainability at a local and national level via the Hunger Banquet, to create positive change at a global level.
<b>FUTURES</b>	
<b>01.6</b> The sustainability of ecological, social and economic systems is achieved through informed individual and community action that values local and global equity and fairness across generations into the future.	ELFG Hunger Banquet resources provide students with the support required to undertake a Hunger Banquet – an informed individual and community action that values equity and fairness in relation to the sustainability of ecological, social and economic systems.
<b>01.7</b> Actions for a more sustainable future reflect values of care, respect and responsibility, and require us to explore and understand environments.	ELFG Hunger Banquet resources encourage students to take actions for a more sustainable future and reflecting values of care, respect and responsibility, specifically in relation to climate change. These actions are framed in the context of exploring and understanding environments and how it impacts on global hunger.
<b>01.9</b> Sustainable futures result from actions designed to preserve and/or restore the quality and uniqueness of environments.	ELFG Hunger Banquet resources help students explore the concept of a sustainable future where everyone had enough to eat, and how their actions can preserve and restore the quality of the environment.
